## Characters:

- Eye (E) round, with four pairs of lenses arranged evenly around the outside (a).
- Coxa 4 (C4) elongated, as deep as the rest of the 4th leg (a).
- Basis of pereopod 7 (B7) with an elongated posterior lobe, taller than the body is deep (a).
- In the male, urosome segment 2 is produced posteriorly (b).


## Additional Information:

Size to 6 mm (Thomas and McCann, 1997), but usually smaller in our samples.

## Similar Species:

Because of its lack of pigment, general body shape, and nearly invisible eye, Argissa hamatipes may easily be confused with Ampelisca. However, the very large C4 and B7 are unique.

Argissa hamatipes is the only described species in the family Argissidae.
